
I would like to also thank those individuals at SCOPE, particularly Ann Nuzzo, and Christine Cosme, and all the staff who assisted with this very successful event.

Baldwin Wins Workforce Innovation Award for Academic Academies Program



Half Hollow Hills High School East students in Mr. Regini’s Project Lead the Way engineering classes were accepted as finalists in the NASA HUNCH program, for which they engineered, designed and prototyped solutions to problems on board the International Space Station. As finalists, they traveled to Johnson Space Center in Houston to visit NASA engineers and astronauts. One of the teams worked on developing a GUI (graphical user interface) to aid in autonomous data collection and analysis for researchers studying the effects of microgravity on plants, fungi, fermentation and crystal growth, while the other team worked on a bulk transfer delivery mechanism to allow astronauts to move contents of materials from large storage units in microgravity. Their work is being considered for implementation on board the International Space Station.

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
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
