Dear Readers,

Wishing each of you a very happy, healthy and prosperous 2023. The shortened days of winter are upon us and the temperatures are chilly. It is time for us at SCOPE to begin planning and preparing for the upcoming summer programs and the fall of 2023. SCOPE Education Services is a not-for-profit organization permanently chartered by the New York State Board of Regents to offer services to the public-school districts in New York State. In Nassau and Suffolk counties, SCOPE provides a variety of services to the children attending our public schools. The largest programs are School-Age Child Care, Universal Pre-Kindergarten and

We at SCOPE are busy preparing for the registration of students who will be participating in these programs this summer and during the 2023-2024 school year.

SCOPE's child care programs are offered in 40 school districts, providing 194 before- and after-school programs. These programs provide safe, fun and age-appropriate child care for children in grades K-6 while their parents/guardians are working. This school year, there are more than 6,700 children attending these programs.

The Universal Pre-Kindergarten program provides a five-hour instructional program for the youngest learners attending our schools. Currently, more than 3,200 children ages 3-4 are attending prekindergarten classes. These programs are offered in 31 public-school districts, totaling 175 classrooms. It is anticipated that New York State will be providing school districts with additional funding which will increase the number of children able to attend in 2023-2024.

SCOPE's enrichment programs allow children to expand their knowledge by participating in different programs. Programs are developed in coordination with the school district to offer an array of learning experiences which expand upon the curriculum taught in the classroom. Enrichment programs are taught by members of the school district faculty. SCOPE provides all materials, supplies, registration, oversight and management of the program. Programs may be offered before and after school, weekends, vacation periods and summer. Last summer alone more than 15,000 children in Nassau and Suffolk counties participated in SCOPE enrichment classes.

New Virtual Foreign Language Enrichment Program Expands Language Literacy

New for spring 2023, SCOPE is offering a virtual after-school foreign language enrichment program for students in grades pre-K-8. Students can elect to take courses in Mandarin, Spanish or computer science languages and learn computer programming. All SCOPE language lessons are offered in the evenings on Zoom. Students across Long Island can sign on and learn with master educators in their respective fields.

SCOPE Universal Pre-K Programs Inspire Love of Learning







The past two school years have witnessed tremendous growth in the number of Universal Pre-Kindergarten programs managed by SCOPE throughout Nassau and Suffolk counties. The increase in New York State funding for a daily five-hour program has encouraged school districts to search for community-based organizations to put these programs in place.

Funding for UPK, however, was not increased and, in fact, moving from a two and a half hour pre-K day to a five-hour pre-K day was simply handled by doubling the allocation given to school districts.

The five-hour pre-K school day has introduced many different conditions to the schools where they are placed. Introduced as almost another grade level, each district's youngest students are positioned to be well prepared for kindergarten. The SCOPE UPK program follows all the requirements set forth by New York State under the oversight of the Office of Early Learning. While there are strong, direct instructional threads throughout the five-hour day, purposeful play is the general form for all activities. Themes, celebrations and crafts serve as the foundations for instruction, and the parent connection is made through phone and text contact, newsletters and classroom events.

SCOPE is mindful of the range of developmental readiness and knowledgeable about the expectations for children of this age. Each school district sets its own expectations and preferred academic attachments. Children are assessed according to developmental progress in the areas of motor development (both gross and fine), language (receptive and expressive), social-emotional and cognition (comprehension). A parent conference is held at least once a year, with frequent contacts between the reporting cycles.

Children taking part in the school district's UPK program are not only prepared for kindergarten, they are also prepared to be students who are familiar with their school setting and the routines of the school day. Kindergarten becomes a simple transition as they become involved in their fifth year of life.

To date, SCOPE has been approached by 36 school districts to assist them in putting a Universal Pre-Kindergarten program in place. At this point, SCOPE has 175 UPK classes located throughout Nassau and Suffolk counties. All SCOPE UPK classes are in school district buildings, most in the home school that will receive the children in kindergarten. SCOPE is both thrilled and honored to be a part of the lives of your children as they start their journey through school.













SCOPE SCHOOL-AGE CHILD CARE PROGRAMS OFFER SO MUCH MORE

For more than 50 years, SCOPE has been a trusted leader in providing quality before- and after-school child care programs throughout Nassau and Suffolk counties. SCOPE child care programs provide working families with the reassurance that their children are in a safe, fun, caring environment where they can learn and grow. SCOPE offers a variety of age-appropriate, supervised games, sports, arts and crafts, STEAM activities, interesting presenters and enrichment opportunities, as well as healthy snacks, scheduled homework time and daily opportunities to socialize with peers.

All SCOPE staff undergo an extensive

background check and meet or exceed all requirements set by the state of New York. SCOPE programs maintain a staffing ratio of one adult to 10 children at all times. SCOPE site directors, district managers and field supervisors are responsible for overseeing the success of the programs. In addition, the Office of Children and Family Services regularly conducts inspections of the programs.

SCOPE is offering 194 before- and after-school programs serving 6,426 students in Nassau and Suffolk counties. SCOPE school-age child care programs are located in 117 elementary school buildings in 39 school districts. In February, SCOPE will be offering a

new before- and after-school child care program at Clayton Huey Elementary School in the Center Moriches School District. In addition, SCOPE also operates one full-time employee day care program for children 8 weeks old to age 4 with 31 children enrolled in the East Meadow School District.

scope programs are open to all elementary school students residing in the school district. Enrollment, which is on a first-come, first-served basis, is subject to capacity limits set by the Office of Children and Family Services regulations. When necessary, students are placed on a waiting list for the next available opening.

The sequenced DNA was of such high quality that the sequences were published in the National Institutes of Health National Center for Biotechnology Information database and presented at the Barcode Long Island Symposium at Cold Spring Harbor Laboratory.

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

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
