Dear Readers,


Wishing each of you a very Happy New Year and a healthy and prosperous 2024!

The arrival of winter and chilly temperatures means that is time for SCOPE to begin planning and preparing for the upcoming summer programs and the fall of 2024. SCOPE Education Services is a not-for-profit organization permanently chartered by the New York State Board of Regents to offer services to public school districts in New York State. In Nassau and Suffolk counties, SCOPE provides a variety of services to the children attending our schools. The largest programs offered by SCOPE include School-Age Child Care, Before- and After-School Child Care, Universal Pre-Kindergarten and Student Enrichment programs. We are busy preparing for the registration of students who will be participating in these programs this summer and for the 2024-2025 school year.

SCOPE's child care programs are offered in 43 school districts with a total of 211 before- and afterschool programs. These programs provide safe, fun and age-appropriate child care for children in grades K-6 while their parents are working. This year, there are more than 7,100 children attending these programs.

The UPK program provides a five-hour instructional program for the youngest learners attending our schools. Currently more than 3,400 children ages 3-4 are attending UPK classes. These programs are offered in 32 public school districts, in a total of 187 classrooms. It is anticipated that New York State may provide public school districts with additional funding, which will increase the number of children able to attend in 2024-2025.

SCOPE's enrichment program allows children to expand their knowledge in a variety of different areas. Programs are developed in coordination with the school district to offer an array of learning experiences which expands what is taught in the classroom. Enrichment programs are taught by members of the school district faculty. SCOPE provides all materials, supplies, registration, oversight and management of



the program. Programs may be offered before or after school, weekends, vacation periods and summer. Last summer alone more than 15,000 children in Nassau and Suffolk counties participated in SCOPE enrichment classes.

You will find additional information regarding each of the above-mentioned programs in this edition of The Forum.

SCOPE is always recruiting qualified individuals to assist with the many programs we offer. We have openings for teachers (retired teachers welcome), teacher assistants, program directors (child care) and child care staff.

A SNEAK PREVIEW OF SOME OF SCOPE'S SUMMER 2024 CAMPS AND COURSES

SCOPE Space Camp Grades K-8 - STEAM, Coding, Rocketry and Robotics

Summer Olympics Sports and Games Grades K-8

Young athletes will engage in exhilarating summer sports and games both indoors and outdoors. From soccer to relay races, basketball, track and field events, and inventive obstacle courses, this program fosters skill development, teamwork and friendly competition. With a focus on inclusivity and fun, SCOPE's expert coaches will guide participants through dynamic activities designed to promote physical fitness, sportsmanship and a love for staying active.

Animal Inspiration Art Camp Grades K-8

SCOPE Universal Pre-K Program Nurturing the Love of Learning

Universal prekindergarten has grown into a necessary level of focused education in New York State. During the last 20 years, the focus on the 3- to 5-year-old child has underscored the need to address child development in purposeful ways. In the past, while systems to assist learning with the preschool child were not clearly defined, formal attention to research-based learning benchmarks of the birth to 5-yearold child evolved into the universal prekindergarten pillar of education we see today.

Prior to the mid-1990s, kindergarten was a half-day program in most school districts throughout New York State, where open play and introduction to student management systems was the mission. It was not considered a full grade level and there were no official assessment or evaluation pieces in place. Kindergarten was a generalized introduction to school as an institution. By the year 2000, full-day kindergarten was accepted as somewhat essential. Gradually, more was spoken about the "K-12" system as a more connected system of education. Around the turn of the millennium, New York City led the way in New York State as the centerpiece for prekindergarten, as it was viewed as critical in meeting the true developmental needs of children.

Throughout this evolution, SCOPE has been in the forefront as an innovative leader in providing universal prekindergarten programs throughout Nassau and Suffolk counties that are designed to address the needs of Long Island's youngest learners. The SCOPE UPK program follows all the requirements set forth by New York State under the oversight of the Office of Early Learning. Throughout the five-hour day, the focus is on purposeful play as the foundation for instruction and learning.

SCOPE is mindful of the range of developmental readiness and knowledgeable about the expectations for children of this age. SCOPE tailors its programs to adhere to each school district's expectations. Children are assessed in areas of motor development (both gross and fine), language (receptive and expressive), social-emotional and

cognition (comprehension). Parent conferences are held at least once a year with frequent contact between reporting cycles. Children who participate in SCOPE UPK programs are prepared for kindergarten and are familiar with their school setting and the routines of the school day, making a smooth and successful transition to kindergarten.







SCOPE is known throughout Nassau and Suffolk counties for providing quality before- and after-school child care programs for more than 50 years. All SCOPE staff undergo an extensive background check and meet or exceed all requirements set by the state of New York. SCOPE offers a variety of engaging, age-appropriate activities where children can play supervised games, sports, arts and crafts, and STEAM activities, and enjoy a healthy snack.

Benefits of SCOPE Before- and After-School School-Age Child Care

- SCOPE programs are established within the child's home school, in most cases, so your child never has to leave his/her home school throughout the day. You can rest assured knowing that security and safety is SCOPE's highest priority.
- Your child is already familiar with his/her school building and the SCOPE staff is trained in managing safe transitions from the time your child enters the SCOPE program until they are safely released at the end of the day to approved adults to be taken home.
- The SCOPE staff is trained to supervise and monitor routines and activities that keep your child engaged while in the program. Proper hygiene, including handwashing, is employed before and after activities and bathroom visits are strictly monitored.
- Throughout your child's time in the SCOPE program there is no down time. Multiple fun activities are planned that are STEAMrelated (science, technology, engineering, the arts, mathematics), arts and crafts connected to holiday celebrations or theme events, and indoor gym or outdoor play experiences. Time for homework completion is also arranged.
- Safety is SCOPE's highest priority. Under the oversight of both SCOPE and the Office of Children and Family Services, regulations regarding adult-to-student ratios, environmental precautions, behavior management and safety guidelines are strictly enforced. Entry and exit to the program are carefully monitored, and no exceptions are made regarding the processes that are put in place.
- While the SCOPE School-Age Child Care Program registers children from grades K-6 and prekindergarten when the numbers and space permit, age groups are divided, keeping younger and older children in separate groups for age-appropriate activities.
- Nutritious snacks and water are provided daily for both the before- and after-school programs. Children enjoy participating in organized activities supervised by experienced adults who keep them safe. Opportunities to play with same-age peers is also invaluable, especially when these opportunities can be so limited at home.



COLD SPRING CSD Cold Spring Harbor High School Earns Prestigious National Grant

Cold Spring Harbor Jr./Sr. High School is the only high school in New York State and one of only eight high schools nationwide to be selected as this year's recipient of the highly competitive national Lemelson-MIT InvenTeam grant. The \$7,500 grant was awarded to create an invention geared toward active and passive tick mitigation strategies that do not require pesticides. A respected panel of university professors, inventors, entrepreneurs, industry professionals and college students, including former InvenTeam members now working in industry, selected the grantees. Under the direction of Jaak Raudsepp, the district's research teacher, the high school Lemelson-MIT


Mineola and Northwell Health Embark on MedVoyage
